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1. Compliance with Objectives of the National Marine Planning Framework

1.1 Introduction

This Attachment has been prepared in support of the Maritime Usage Licence (MUL) Application for marine surveys associated with the Marine Modelling Study (MMS) being undertaken by Uisce Éireann along the Irish coast, from Carlingford Lough to Kilcoole. The marine surveys comprise the deployment and recovery of Acoustic Doppler Current Profilers (ADCPs), bathymetric surveys, and passive water quality sampling (hereafter referred to as the Marine Surveys), within Proposed Licence Areas A–D. Further details of the Marine Surveys and Proposed Licence Areas A–D can be found in Part 3 of the MUL Application.

The purpose of this document is to provide a clear and proportionate assessment of compliance with the *National Marine Planning Framework (NMPF) 2021* and its implementing Irish legislation. It demonstrates that the proposed Marine Surveys will be compliant with the Irish Government's vision, objectives and marine policies.

1.2 Quality Assurance and Statement of Authority

This report, and the assessment described within it, has been completed in accordance with the AECOM Integrated Management System (IMS). 1.3 NMPF Objective

The National Marine Planning Framework (NMPF) 2021 for Ireland is the country's first comprehensive spatial planning framework which brings together all marine-based human activities and outlines the Irish Government's vision, objectives and marine policies for each marine activity, including policies for protecting biodiversity and marine protected sites (Department of Housing, Local Government and Heritage, 2021). The NMPF sets out Overarching Marine Planning Policies that will apply to all marine activities or development. These include policies in relation to, inter alia, co-existence with biodiversity, coastal and island communities, and infrastructure. The relevant environmental policies and objectives of the NMPF 2021 are under the Environmental – Ocean Health pillar, which aim to protect marine ecosystems while enabling sustainable use of the maritime area. The relevant policies include:

Biodiversity (Policies 1 - 4): Protect, conserve and restore marine biodiversity, avoiding significant adverse effects on habitats and species;

Protected Marine Sites (Policies 1 - 4): Ensure no adverse effects on the integrity of European sites (SACs/SPAs) and support conservation objectives;

- Non-Indigenous Species (Policy 1): Prevent introduction and spread of invasive non-native species;
- Water Quality (Policies 1 - 2): Maintain and improve marine water quality and prevent deterioration;
- Sea-floor and Water Column Integrity (Policies 1 - 3): Avoid significant disturbance to seabed habitats and maintain natural processes;
- Marine Litter (Policy 1): Minimise marine litter and prevent pollution;
- Underwater Noise (Policy 1): Avoid significant adverse impacts from anthropogenic underwater noise;
- Air Quality (Policies 1 - 2): Minimise emissions to air from marine activities; and

Climate Change (Policies 1 - 2): Support climate mitigation and adaptation, including minimising greenhouse gas emissions.

These objectives are assessed in the context of the scale, duration and nature of the Marine Surveys.

1.4 Compliance Check

The Marine Surveys have limited interaction with the water environment and are restricted to short-term, localised activities, including the temporary deployment and recovery of seabed-mounted instruments and vessel-based survey operations. These activities may result in minor, localised disturbance to seabed sediments and very small, short-lived increases in suspended sediment concentrations in the immediate vicinity of Marine Surveys.

The only direct interaction with the seabed will arise from the placement and recovery of ADCPs units, which may result in minor and temporary disturbance to sediments and discrete locations. Survey vessels will operate over short timeframes within a receiving environment that already accommodates routine maritime activity. No discharges to the marine environment are proposed. Given the scale and nature of the marine surveys, any disturbance to the seabed or water column will be temporary and rapidly reversible, with no potential to result in measurable changes to water quality or benthic conditions at the scale of the relevant water bodies. The receiving environment is already subject to routine maritime activity, and the marine surveys are consistent with this baseline.

There is a very low risk of accidental pollution associated with vessel operations; however, no discharges are proposed, and all vessels will operate in accordance with the International Convention for the Prevention of Marine Pollution from Ships (MARPOL) Convention and standard industry controls. As such, the likelihood of any pollution event is minimal, and any effects would be localised and short-term.

Overall, the scale, duration and nature of the marine surveys are such that no deterioration in Ireland seas is anticipated. The Marine Surveys are therefore consistent with the objectives of the NMPF. A summary of compliance with the relevant NMPF policy objectives is provided in Table 1.

1.5 Conclusion

The Marine Surveys are aligned with the Environmental – Ocean Health objectives of the NMPF, with all potential impact pathways determined to be temporary, localised and therefore not significant. The development of water quality models to support water quality assessments through Marine Surveys supports and enhances the policy objectives of the NMPF, by providing the ability to assess water quality against environmental legislation.

The Marine Surveys are therefore considered to be fully compliant with the overall objectives and policies of the NMPF.
